

It was reported that a Loudoun County 'gender-fluid' teen gained access to the girls' school bathroom and sexually assaulted a female student. Yet Jennifer Wexton introduced a bill that would allow school principals to hide certain crimes committed at schools from the police.

 - **The parents of the victim in the first assault asserted that the youth is gender fluid and the incident occurred in a girls’ bathroom.** “The parents of the victim of the first alleged assault issued a statement Thursday through the Stanley Law Group blaming school officials. They asserted that the charged youth is ‘gender-fluid’ and that the incident occurred in a girls’ bathroom. Wexton introduced a bill that would repeal the requirement of school principals to report certain crimes to police:
