

Emilia Sykes Liberal Vote History

Emilia Sykes has a long liberal record dating back to her time as a Ohio State Representative. Even though she ran as a moderate in 2020, her voting record in Congress has been with the liberal wing of her party. As seen in the below examples she has continued to keep her connections to corrupt political figures, including the former Ohio Speaker, and continued her liberal votes, including voting against legislation that would keep our streets safer to helping grow our economy and end inflation.

- As a member of the Ohio House of Representatives, Emilia Sykes helped Larry Householder get elected to be Speaker of the House. Vernon Sykes described the relationship between Larry Householder and Emilia Sykes as “an ungodly coalition.” Householder was later convicted in a \$61 million bribery scheme with FirstEnergy.
 - Sykes has taken thousands of dollars from FirstEnergy.
 - “And Householder, who now faces 162 charges of campaign finance violations, could not have risen to power without [Sykes].”
- Emilia Sykes has said that she identifies with Kamala Harris “for many reasons.”
- In December 2017, Emilia Sykes voted against legislation that would prohibit an abortion if the child has down syndrome.
- As a state representative, Emilia Sykes voted in favor of raising the gas tax.
- In January 2023, Emilia Sykes voted against H.R. 26, the Born-Alive Abortion Survivors Protection Act.
- In January 2023, Emilia Sykes voted against H.Con.Res. 3, which would condemn recent attacks on pro-life facilities, groups, and churches and calls on the current presidential administration to use appropriate law enforcement authorities to support their safety.
- In February 2023, Emilia Sykes voted against H.J.Res. 24, which would nullify Washington D.C.’s Local Resident Voting Rights Amendment Act of 2022, which allowed noncitizen residents to vote in local elections.
- In February 2023, Emilia Sykes voted against H.J.Res. 26, which would nullify Washington D.C.’s Revised Criminal Code Act of 2022, which would weaken the city’s criminal codes and sentencing guidelines.
- In March 2023, Emilia Sykes voted against H.R. 140, the Protecting Speech from Government Interference Act, which would generally prohibit federal employees from censoring the speech of others while acting in an official capacity.
- In March 2023, Emilia Sykes voted against H.R. 5, the Parents Bill of Rights Act, which would establish rights for parents and guardians regarding the public education of their children.

- In March 2023, Emilia Sykes voted against H.R. 1, the Lower Energy Costs Act, which would expedite the development, importation, and exportation of energy resources.
- In April 2023, Emilia Sykes voted against H.R. 734, the Protection of Women and Girls in Sports Act of 2023.
- In April and June 2023, Emilia Sykes voted against H.J.Res. 42, which would nullify Washington D.C.'s Comprehensive Policing and Justice Reform Amendment Act of 2022, which would reform policing procedures within Washington D.C.
- In April 2023, Emilia Sykes voted against H.R. 2811, the Limit, Save, Grow Act of 2023, which would increase the federal debt limit and decrease spending, repeal several energy tax credits, modify the permitting process and other requirements for energy projects, expand work requirements for the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) and other programs, and nullify regulations for the cancellation of federal student loan debt.
- In May 2023, Emilia Sykes voted against H.R. 2494, the Protect Our Law enforcement with Immigration Control and Enforcement Act of 2023 or the POLICE Act of 2023, which would make assaulting a law enforcement officer, firefighter, or other first responder a deportable offense.
- In June 2023, Emilia Sykes voted against H.R. 1615, the Gas Stove Protection and Freedom Act, which would prohibit the Consumer Product Safety Commission from using federal rules to regulate gas stoves as a banned hazardous product or to issue or enforce a product safety standard that prohibits the use or sale of gas stoves, substantially increases the price of gas stoves, or makes a type of product unavailable based on the kind of fuel it consumes.
- In July 2023, Emilia Sykes voted against H.R. 2670, the National Defense Authorization Act for Fiscal Year 2024, which would authorized a pay raise for our military.
