Deluzio Voted Against The Fiscal 2024 Military Construction-VA Appropriations Bill And Pay Raises For Active-Duty Military

On July 27, 2023, Deluzio Voted Against The Fiscal 2024 Military Construction-VA Appropriations Bill. “Passage of the bill that would provide \$317.4 billion in mandatory and discretionary funding for the VA, including \$121 billion for VA medical care programs, \$166 billion for veteran disability compensation and other benefits, \$151.4 billion for veteran pensions, \$17.5 billion for military construction projects and \$2 billion for military personnel housing. It would also provide \$293 million for the North Atlantic Treaty Organization Security Investment Program, intended to counter Russian and Chinese military activities. Among other provisions, it would prohibit the use of funds provided by the bill to close or realign Naval Station Guantanamo Bay and provide \$189 million for Arlington National Cemetery, including funding for its southern expansion. The bill would allow the use of funding for the Veterans Affairs Department Medical Services to reimburse veterans and their spouses for assisted reproductive technology treatments or adoption expenses. It would also prohibit the use of the bill's funds to provide abortions, to implement a September 2022 VA rule that allows abortion counseling and establishes exceptions for the prohibition on abortions in the medical benefits package for veterans and civilian beneficiaries, to provide surgical procedures or hormone therapies for gender-affirming care, and to fly or display a flag over a VA facility or national cemetery that is not the U.S. flag, military-related or another government jurisdiction. As amended, the bill would prohibit the use of the bill's funds to interfere with a veteran's participation in a legal state medical cannabis program, to enforce COVID-19 mask mandates, and to implement the COVID-19 vaccination program for VA health care personnel.” (H.R. 4366, [Roll Call Vote #380](#): Passed 219-211: R 219-2; D 0-209; 7/27/23, Deluzio Voted Nay; [CQ Summary](#), Accessed 8/3/23)

“House Republicans on Thursday passed their first government funding bill, overcoming an initial hurdle in Speaker Kevin McCarthy’s (R-Calif.) attempts to wrangle the GOP conference to approve all 12 appropriations bills amid intense pressure from conservatives to lower spending levels. The bill — which allocates funding for military construction, the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) and related agencies — passed in a 219-211 vote. Two Republicans — Reps. Deluzio Voted Against “Department Of Defense Appropriations Act, 2025” Which Included Pay Raises For Active Duty Military

On June 28, 2024, Deluzio Voted Against The FY 2025 Defense Department Appropriations Package Which Included a 4.5 Percent Pay Raise. “Passage of the bill, as amended, that would that would provide \$833.1 billion in net discretionary defense spending for fiscal 2025. The bill would provide \$294.2 billion for operations and maintenance activities, \$165.3 billion for weapons and other procurement, \$146 billion for military research and development, \$41.2 billion for the Defense Health Program and \$183.7 billion for military personnel, including a 4.5 percent pay raise for all military personnel, along with an additional 15 percent pay increase for junior enlisted servicemembers. The bill would provide \$500 million for Israeli cooperative programs, including \$110 million for the Iron Dome missile defense system. It also would allocate \$1.9 billion for prior year shipbuilding increases. Among its policy provisions, it would shift combatant command

responsibility for Mexico to the U.S. Southern Command within 180 days of the bill's enactment. It would prohibit funds under the bill from being transferred to the Wuhan Institute of Virology or to transfer or release detainees at Guantanamo Bay. It also would prohibit the use of funds to promote critical race theory, enforce certain COVID-19 mandates, or promote critical race theory. As amended, it would prohibit the use of funds provided by the bill for classified telework or remote work for Defense Department employees. It also would prohibit the use of funds under the bill to enforce a provision of the Fiscal 2019 defense authorization law that allows the Defense secretary to waive the requirement to certify that China has met the conditions for participation in Rim of the Pacific naval exercises if such waiver is in the interest of U.S. national security.” (H.R. 8774, [Roll Call #331](#), Passed 217-198, R 212-1, D 5-197, Deluzio Voted Nay; 6/28/24; [CQ Summary](#), Accessed 7/1/24)
